Discourse

The book is about the morality and law in shaping today's legal thinking. He succinctly presented on the version of law on one side and morality on the other. While many issues, which may be legal as per the existing laws, may not be moral. The juxtaposition of morality with law hinges on few principles. Although, morality stands as a source of law, the two ideas may collide in some instances. In many instances laws are a result

of human thinking, while morality is a practice carried over years, which is accepted by the community. Morality has a binding force in many communities. He gave different examples on how law and morals conflict. In some instances, abortion can be legal in some countries, while at the same time; social morale may prohibit it as morally wrong and sinful. These may pose serious dilemmas over which is right?

The main take away from the book is:

- a) Understand philosophical ideas that are shaping our world today;
- b) Confront conflicts faced when given the choice of morality;
- c) Apply various philosophical ideas to politics, religion, economics, relationships, and medicine; and
- d) Discuss basic philosophical arguments.
